Municipal Notes

COUNCIL NEWS

Mayor and Council would like to congratulate all of the graduates at Lillian Berg School this year. Best of luck to you all as you move on to High School! We'd also like to take the time and thank all the staff at the Lillian Berg School. The programs and events that are offered to kids in Machin and the surrounding communities because of your hard work is truly appreciated.

The playground and fitness equipment at the Pine Tree Park has been installed! We encourage everyone to head out to the waterfront to see the equipment and play safe. As a reminder, the entire costs of the project were funded by the Ontario Trillium Foundation through the Capital Grant stream which municipalities can apply for equipment/products related to healthy active living.

On Tuesday June 20th, Councillor Ray Pilkey, on behalf of the Municipality, attended the Treaty #3 150th Anniversary celebrations in Dryden. A presentation on the history of Treaty #3 and words from Don Jones & Treaty #3 were just a couple of the many great activities that took place that day. Thank you to the City of Dryden and Treaty #3 for hosting and inviting our Municipality.

Machin staff followed up with the Ministry of Transportation's Associate Minister Cho's office on some of the issues we discussed with them at the NOMA Conference in April. Issues discussed at the NOMA Conference were regarding digital speed sign permitting, land transfer delays, and the Cascade Bridge connecting link issue. The Municipality put the main emphasis on dealing with the Cascade Bridge issue, more specifically allowing Machin to apply for funding through the Connecting Links Program for the eventual replacement of the Cascade Bridge. This program provides provincial funding for roads and bridges that are connecting links to highways as designated by legislation. This is an issue that has been brought up in the past; however, it's importance continues to get higher as the years go on and is something we want addressed as soon as possible.

Staff from Minister Piccini's office (Minister of the Ministry of Environment, Conservation, and Parks) were able to get Mayor Griffiths and municipal staff a meeting with Ministry employees to talk about current Machin landfill issues. Although we are appreciative of the time spent discussing this issue, we are not happy with the answers that we received. Working through government legislation is not easy, or fun. Trying to highlight where particular legislation is directed to larger areas like southern Ontario is an ongoing process. We will continue to try and work on this problem and will keep the public updated as we do.

Everyone please welcome Cheryl Murray to the Municipality of Machin staff! Cheryl has accepted the position of Deputy Clerk. We are happy to have you here!

EDO:

The Municipality applied for two grants in June, one to the Ontario Trillium Foundation (OTF) and the other to FedNor. Under the capital grant that is offered by OTF, municipalities are able to apply for equipment that are related to extending the lifespan of a facility, more specifically facilities that result in healthy/active lifestyles. Machin applied for the costs of removing the current hot water tank boiler system and installing 3 on-demand tankless hot water units in the Woodland Arena. The current system is no longer working and must be replaced before the 2023 season. Through the Community Initiative program offered by FedNor, the Municipality applied for another 3 years of funding for an Economic Development Officer position. The proposed funding is setup as a decreasing amount each year to try and shift the Municipality's focus to financially sustaining the position on their own. The goal is project implementation, we hope to have certain development projects completed in the next couple years to sustain this position.

Preliminary surveying has been completed at the V-Bay North Cemetery in June, by mid-July the entire survey should be completed and we will be moving forward in the Crown Land disposition process. We started this project in April of 2021 and this project is a great example to show the lengthy time process that is involved for Crown Land disposition. I was able to talk more with a staff member from Minister Piccini's Office as well as Minister Rickford's office this past month on our Ely Lake Cottage Lot Development Project. Both offices are aware and have heard our concerns with the Lakeshore Capacity Assessment and are doing everything they can to get us answers as well as progress this project.

The former Credit Union building has officially been sold. If you recall in the January Messenger it was mentioned that a rent-toown agreement was in place for the building. Welcome West End Cannabis, who is now up and operating in Vermilion Bay! The funds received from this sale are going to be used towards future development projects and the costs that go along with them.

This is a Door to Door Service – you do not have to worry about parking or walking. We drop you off right at the door of your medical appointment or essential shopping and return to pick you up.

You do not have to be a senior to use this service. Any adult can ride, however seniors do come first for this service.



Fuel and Boat Safety Tips for A Safer Summer

Treat fuel with care. Despite its everyday use, it's important not to underestimate the dangers of gasoline. **Filling gasoline containers:**

Only use fuel containers that have been certified by an accredited certification organization such as the Canadian Standards Association (CSA) International or the Underwriters Laboratories of Canada (ULC).

Keep portable containers at least three metres away from sparks or ignitions sources and on the ground, with the dispensing nozzle in full contact with the container in order to prevent buildup and discharge of static electricity – a possible source of ignition.

Fill containers only about 90% full to allow some room for expansion.

When finished refilling the container, tighten both the fill and vent caps.

Storing gasoline – Store fuel containers in a detached garage or shed, well away from all heat sources, including direct sunlight. Never leave the container in the trunk of a car.

Using and refilling gas-powered engines:

Turn off equipment as well as any auxiliary power sources and allow equipment to cool down for a few minutes before refuelling.

Stay at least three metres away from sparks or ignition sources.

Keep a BC Class fire extinguisher handy as water will only spread the flames of a gasoline-based fire.

Only use gas powered equipment in a well-ventilated area, never in an enclosed space such as a garage, basement or tent.

Disposing of gasoline:

The best way to dispose of gasoline is to use it up. Small amounts can be left outside to evaporate – leave in an open container away from children and pets.

If gasoline must be discarded, take it to a hazardous waste disposal centre. Never pour gasoline onto the ground, into a lake, down the drain, etc.

Boating – It is your responsibility to ensure you are well-trained and informed about how to stay safe on the water. **Always Wear Your Lifejacket** – if you don't wear it, it won't work. OPP data shows that eight out of ten victims who die in boating incidents are not wearing a Personal Floatation Device (PFD). Most drownings happen unexpectedly when boat capsizes, or someone falls overboard. Having a PFD on board is not good enough; it needs to be worn.

Don't Drink and Boat - the same laws apply to boating as apply to driving.

Be Prepared – know your boat and have safety equipment onboard.

Stay Clear and Stay Safe Around Dams – Stay back from waters above or below hydro facilities; keep out of areas with fences, buoys, booms and barriers; never stand, anchor or tie your boat below a dam; and always obey all warning signs.

Courteous Boating – be good neighbours, help others when they need it, clean up after yourself and be respectful to the people and environment around you.

Spring has arrived and with it comes the urge to renovate your home or perhaps start a new build. As a Municipality of Machin resident, it is your responsibility to acquire a building/demolition permit **before** you start your building/demolition project. It is also your responsibility to be aware of the Machin Zoning Bylaws.

The following is a list of items to help you determine whether a permit would be required for a renovation project in the Municipality of Machin:

• Constructing accessory buildings with an area of more than 15 square metres (160 square feet), or an addition to an existing building

- Constructing attached or detached garages
- Structural alterations
- Excavating, repairing, or underpinning a foundation
- Heating ventilation, air conditioning, plumbing, or electrical work
- Constructing one or more new separate dwelling units within a building
- Finishing previously unfinished spaces within a building
- Adding new entrances or windows, changing the size of entrances or windows, or closing entrances or windows
- Constructing chimneys or fireplaces
- Installing swimming pool enclosures, constructing detached decks more than 60.96 centimetres (24 inches) above ground, or building any deck attached to a building.
- Demolishing or relocating all or part of a building.

You are not required to obtain a permit for these renovations:

- Replacing stucco, siding, or shingles with the same material
- Replacing doors or windows without altering the opening,
- Constructing fences (except pool enclosure fences)
- Patching, painting, and decorating
- Installing cabinets or shelves

Prefabricated accessory buildings are becoming more and more popular, and they do require a permit when over 15 square meters in size. These types of buildings have usage limitations in the Ontario Building Code and in the Machin Zoning Bylaw. 


