Municipal Notes

COUNCIL NEWS

The year seems to be going by quickly as we're already entering into March. We hope everyone was able to have a safe and enjoyable Family Day with friends and family. Thank you to Bruyere's Bobcat Service for hosting a sliding party on Family Day weekend and providing free hot dogs and hot chocolate for anyone that attended. Thank you as well to everyone who supported the many different events held on Family Day weekend by different community organizations like the Vermilion Bay Lions Club, Vermilion Bay Kinsmen, and Eagle Lake Skating Club. These events are a great way to get out, socialize, and support the very important community clubs/organizations in Machin and surrounding areas.

The City of Kenora did a wonderful job hosting the Kenora District Municipal Association on February 8th-10th and we'd like to thank Kenora staff, volunteers, event sponsors, and everyone involved in making the conference a success. Mayor Gordon Griffiths, Councillor Ray Pilkey, Councillor Greg Swanson, and EDO Max Nagy attended the conference. KDMA is important for smaller municipalities like ourselves as it gives a larger voice to advocate for our issues. We are optimistic that new information learned and new connections made at the conference will prove to benefit our community in the short and long term.

The Municipality received the Ministry of Environment, Conservation, and Parks inspection report for the Vermilion Bay Landfill from the on-site inspection in October of 2023. We plan on working with Public Works and other municipal staff to complete the items that're listed as "not in compliance" on this report. We'll once again be stalling on completing any studies/work needed to update the capacity of the dump until we receive funding from the government for the unincorporated areas that use our landfill. We don't feel that taxpayers should have to subsidize these costs since the landfill is used by camps and households in the surrounding unincorporated areas of Machin.

The Kenora Devils Gap Islanders played their final game at the Woodland Arena at the end of February. Thank you to the Islanders team, staff, and ownership for being so open and easygoing at our arena this year. We appreciate you having these games in our community and wish you all the best with the rest of your season! A big thank you goes out to arena staff and all the hardworking volunteers that helped out at the games this season; we would not have been able to host these games without you!

Mayor Gordon Griffiths and our EDO Max Nagy had a virtual meeting with staff in Minister Sarkaria's office at the end of February. Minister Sarkaria is currently the Minister of Transportation. The main issue discussed during this meeting was regarding the state of the Cascade Bridge and the need for funding from the government to assist with the replacement costs. As some may be aware, the engineer inspection report for the Cascade Bridge in 2021 stated it needed immediate repairs and that the replacement of the bridge is recommended in the next 5-10 years. We've previously tried to apply through the Connecting Links Program but are not eligible since the bridge is not a connecting link as defined in the Public Transportation and Highway Improvement Act. We made it clear we are fully aware we do not meet the requirements of the Connecting Links Program but need the Minister's Office to advocate for us and push to have us accepted into the program or help with another avenue of funding for the bridge.

Economic Development:

We are applying to the Northern Ontario Heritage Fund Corporations Rural Enhancement Fund for 90% of costs to be covered to upgrade/renovate the Happy Go Lucky Seniors Centre. Some of the work includes the following: acoustic renovations to increase the sound quality of the building, replacing windows, replacing doors, new concrete floor for their garage, and other activities. This particular application comes in two phases. With luck we'll move onto phase 2 and if approved we should have a decision in summer of 2024.

The Municipality has decided to apply to the Ontario Trillium Foundations Capital Grant for new exercise equipment, water bottle station, and fans at our Woodland Arena Gym. The project would include basically a full changeover of the current equipment at the gym and replace it with new, up to date equipment. New equipment would include: two stationary bikes, one treadmill, one recumbent bike, Jacob's ladder machine, set of dumbbells, new bench press/squat rack, Olympic bar and weights, back machine, and other items for the gym. This grant would eliminate the need to purchase any new equipment for many years to come as well as offer all the weight lifting services you'd find in many larger gyms!

Unfortunately, I don't have any new updates at this time for our ongoing development projects. I hope to provide some progress updates in next months Messenger, if you ever have any questions regarding previously mentioned projects or what's happening in the Municipality, feel free to give me a call at 807-227-3005.

When changing clocks on March 10th, it is also a good time to test your smoke alarms and carbon monoxide (CO) alarms and change replaceable batteries. In order for smoke alarms and carbon monoxide (CO) alarms to do their job of helping to save your life, they must have working batteries.

Smoke and CO alarms with non-replaceable 10-year batteries are designed to remain effective for up to 10 years. If the alarm chirps, warning that the battery is low, replace the entire alarm right away.

Smoke and CO alarms with any other type of battery need a new battery at least once a year. If the alarm chirps, warning the battery is low, replace the battery right away.

When replacing a battery, always follow manufacturer's instructions. If specific to the batteries (brand and model) that must be used, the smoke alarm may not work properly if a different kind of battery is used.

Smoke alarms – required on every storey of the home and outside all sleeping areas. For added protection, it is recommended to also install smoke alarms inside all bedrooms.

When there is a fire, a quick escape is critical and every second counts. Always keep all exits easily accessible and windows able to open freely. Have a home fire escape plan, so that everyone knows what to do if the alarm sounds, where to meet outside and to get out and stay out. Call 911 from outside the home.

Carbon monoxide (CO) alarms – required outside all sleeping areas, if your home has a fuel-burning appliance, fireplace or attached garage. For added protection, it is recommended to also install CO alarms on every storey of home.

To reduce the risk of carbon monoxide build-up, keep chimneys and intake/exhaust vents for furnaces and heating appliances free of debris, ice and snow accumulations; only burn dry, well-seasoned wood in fireplaces and woodstoves; and open the flu before using a fireplace for adequate ventilation. Never use barbeques inside garages and never run a vehicle or other fueled engine or motor inside a garage, even if the garage doors are open. Always remove a vehicle from the garage immediately after starting it.

If your CO alarm sounds, and you or other occupants are suffering from symptoms of CO poisoning (flu-like symptoms without a fever, headache, nausea, dizziness, confusion, drowsiness and/or loss of consciousness) get everyone out of the home immediately.

Different alarms sounds:

Smoke alarms and CO alarms sound different than each other. Everyone in the household should know the difference between the two alarms sounds.

Low-battery warning – consult the smoke alarm or CO alarm manufacturer's instructions for what the low-battery warning sounds like. Replace the battery if the low-battery warning sounds.

"End-of-life" warning - consult the smoke alarm or CO alarm manufacturer's instructions for what the "end-of-life" warning sounds like. Replace the alarm if the "end-of-life" warning sounds.

Additional Best Practices for Smoke Alarms and Carbon Monoxide Alarms:

It is recommended that smoke alarms and CO alarms be tested monthly or in accordance with the manufacturer's instructions. Replace if not working properly.

Keep smoke alarms and CO alarms free from dust and cobwebs and do not paint or contaminate them.
