Municipal Notes

COUNCIL NEWS

As the leaves turn colour and temperatures begin to get colder, we can start to feel that winter is on its way. We hope everyone is enjoying the last bit of nice weather we have left before the next season begins! Dump hours have officially changed for the season. The new hours are posted in this Messenger and can also be found on our website under Waste Disposal.

We would like to welcome back Andrea Hatton to the Municipality! Andrea has decided to come back to her former position as the Backup Operator at the Water Treatment Plant.

November is a month we take time to reflect, thank, and honour those who have served and continue to serve our Country. On November 11th, Remembrance Day, we will be having a ceremony at the cenotaph in Vermilion Bay and hope that you can attend. Without the courage of our veterans, we would not be where we are today. Lest we forget.

We had a productive month in October for progressing current projects like the Vermilion Bay North Cemetery and former CP Property. For the cemetery project, we issued a Request for Proposal for the surveying work to be completed. From this RFP, we accepted the proposal from TBT Engineering and are excited that we continue to move forward on this project. For the former CP Property, Council accepted a proposal from Pinchin Environmental Engineering to complete a Phase 1 Environmental Site Assessment and file a Record of Site Condition. When this is completed, we will be one step closer to having the site development ready.

Council would like to take this opportunity to thank municipal staff for their support and contribution over the last four years in helping make our term successful in many ways. We have enjoyed working with residents as we all try to grow the great community we live in, thank you! We'd like to give a big thank you to Ron Kujansuu

for his dedication to the Municipality and his last 12 years of service on Council! Thank you to Garry Parkes for his time and effort in bettering the community with our previous Council. Congratulations to this year's candidates on their success in the election! The following were elected:

Mayor: Gordon Griffiths

Council: Ray Pilkey (Incumbent), Dennis Peterson (Incumbent), Tony Blair, Greg Swanson.

Thank you to everyone who submitted their name. The new Council will take the reins on November 15th at 6pm at the Special Council meeting at the Municipal Office!

Economic Development:

I was able to have a virtual meeting with the district planner for the Ministry of Northern Development, Mines, Natural Resources, and Forestry Dryden District to talk about our Ely Lake project. They informed me of certain areas of our proposal that need to be more elaborated on as well as areas that need to be directly changed. One of these areas is the issue of the Langton Township Road access point. The Ministry of Transportation will not allow this development to occur unless the Municipality assumes ownership of this road for which the lots would front; something the Municipality does not want to do. This will continue to be a battle but it is something we do not want to budge on. I'd like to remind residents that so far this development has cost no money, only Council and municipal staff time. We will not follow through with this project if the benefits do not outweigh the costs; something we are monitoring as the project progresses.

We recently found out that we were declined funding through the Ontario Government for accessibility upgrades to our municipal office. Disappointing to hear but something we are not giving up on. At the beginning of November, we applied through the small projects stream of the Enabling Accessibility Fund (Federal Fund) for close to \$100,000 for accessibility improvements at our office. We hope we are successful with this application; applications like these are vital as they cut costs and help us make mandatory improvements.

Lastly, we are still looking for volunteers to join the Eco-

nomic Development Committee! As mentioned before, the committee will meet close to once a month and discuss current projects and future projects/ideas. Meeting minutes will be made available to the public to promote transparency and keep everyone up to date.

Woodland Arena:



Carbon Monoxide Awareness Week, November 1-7 Beat the Silent Killer: Prevent CO in Your Home

In Ontario, more than 65% of injuries and deaths from CO occur in the home.

You must have a working carbon monoxide alarm adjacent to each sleeping area of the home if your home has a fuel-burning appliance, a fireplace or an attached garage. For added protection, install a carbon monoxide alarm on every storey of the home according to manufacturer's instructions. Fuel-burning appliances can include furnaces, hot water heaters, gas or wood fireplaces, portable fuel-burning heaters, generators, barbeques, stoves and vehicles.

What is Carbon Monoxide (CO)?

- CO is known as the silent killer because it is an invisible, tasteless and odour-less gas that can be deadly.
- CO is produced when fuels such as propane, gasoline, natural gas, heating oil or wood do not burn completely in fuel-burning appliances and devices.

Prevent CO in your home:

- Ensure fuel-burning appliances, chimneys and vents are cleaned and inspected annually.
- Check that all outside appliance vents are not blocked.
- Gas and charcoal barbeques should only be used outside, away from all doors, windows, vents, and other building openings. Never use barbeques inside garages, even if the doors are open.
- Portable fuel-burning generators should only be used outdoors in well-ventilated areas away from windows, doors, vents and other building openings.
- Ensure all portable fuel-burning heaters are vented properly, according to manufacturer's instructions.
- Never use the stove or oven to heat your home.
- Open the flu before using a fireplace for adequate ventilation.
- Never run a vehicle or other fueled engine or motor inside a garage, even if the garage doors are open.

Know the symptoms of CO:

• Exposure to CO can cause flu-like symptoms such as headaches, nausea, dizziness, as well as confusion, drowsiness, loss of consciousness and death.

- If your CO alarm sounds, and you or other occupants suffer from symptoms of CO poisoning, get everyone out of the home immediately. Then call 9-1-1 from outside the building.
- If your CO alarm sounds, and no one is suffering from symptoms of CO poisoning, check to see if the battery needs replacing, or the alarm has reached its "end-of-life" before calling 9-1-1.

Know the sound of your CO alarm:

• Your CO alarm sounds different than your smoke alarm. Test both alarms monthly and make sure everyone in your home knows the difference between the two alarm sounds.


Don't be confused by the sound of your CO alarm's low-battery warning. Follow your CO alarm manufacturer's instructions so you know the difference between the low-battery warning, the "end-of-life" warning, and the alarm alerting you to the presence of CO in your home.

Testing and Replacing CO alarms:

- Test CO alarms every month by pressing the test button.
- Replace batteries every year.
- Replace CO alarms according to manufacturer's instructions.
- It is against the law to remove the batteries or tamper with CO alarms in any-Way.

We would like to thank Ms. Elliott, the retired teachers, KPDSB Dryden Board Office, parents and community members and businesses, Machin Fire Department and the OPP for helping to keep students hydrated and for encouragement and safety on this journey.

Several members of Dryden's Ice Dog Hockey Team came for a surprise visit to hand out FREE season passes to Ice Dog home games in Dryden for students in grades 1-6. It was great to have our students included in their efforts to be known as a part of the local communities.

We are very grateful to our local Vermilion Bay Co-op for accommodating our needs to make the "School Milk Program run smoothly. About a quarter of students are signed up to receive milk at lunchtime. We also implemented a "Hot Lunch Program" which happens every Thursday. 


